Students who have earned an associate degree from Sheridan College and are seeking a baccalaureate degree from Western Montana College still must successfully complete all specific courses required in the major beyond the college-wide general education requirement. Further academic, residency, and course requirements must be met at Western Montana College for completion of a degree.
